There are three activities to try: 1. Make some squirmy jelly worms, 2. Pick an activity of your choice from the selection and 3. Make your own wormery

1. Make some squirmy jelly worms

This is my favourite! Pack straws into a cup and secure them with a rubber band. Pour jelly carefully into the straws. Once the jelly has set, rinse with some warm water to release the worms from their straws. You could talk about how the jelly starts as a solid, then changes to a liquid and then back to a solid! Can you describe how the jelly worms feel?

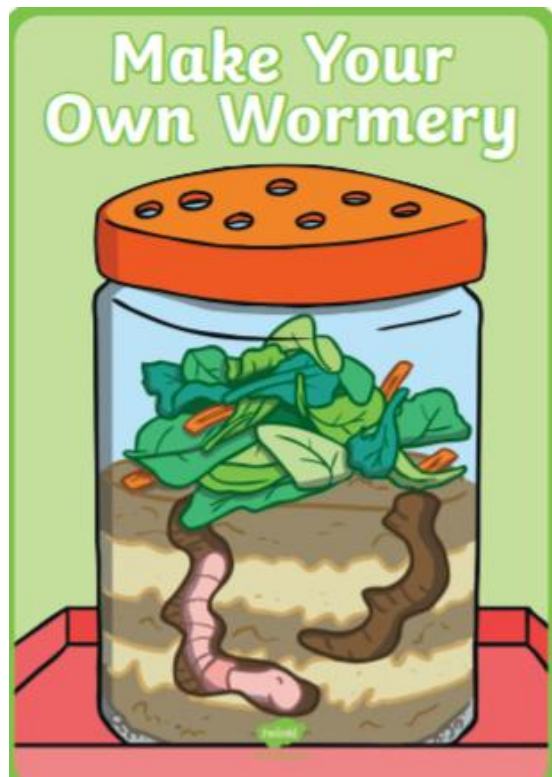
