Please choose 1 challenge from the list below to do every day at home over the next week.



The challenges this week all focus on our topic of Animals Big and Small. This week we will be looking at sea animals.

It is internet safety day on 9th February. Take a look at the PowerPoint from Digi Dog about internet safety tips and think about what you would keep safe in a treasure chest and then how you would keep safe online.



Our Right of the month for February is 'the right to all rights'. Use Jit write to say which right you think is your most important right. Under this write down what you think is an important right for an animal that lives in the sea.



Dolly the Dolphin is going to the sea supermarket and wants to buy some fish. Can you help her to work out which coins she needs to buy each fish? Use real coins to help you if you need to. Find the sheet by logging in to Hwb, going to J2E and then shared files.



Look at the images below to see what is happening to our Oceans. Try this simple experiment to see how sea animals are affected by rubbish. Fill a glass jar with water and drop in some sea creature pictures or toys attached to some string. See how freely they move. Next add some rubbish such as sweet wrappers and see what happens to the sea creatures.







Know Your Rights!



We have rights!

All children and young people have rights. These rights are the things that children need to be safe, healthy and happy. The United Nations has a list of all the rights that children have. This list is called the UN Convention on the Rights of the Child, or UNCRIC for short.

To make sure that you get your rights the Children's Commissioner for Wales has five super powers. They are to:

- Listen to what you have to say.
- Speak up about things that are important to you.
- Tell you about your rights.
- Help to make sure that you get your rights.
- Talk to you if you have a problem.



Want to know your rights?

There are 54 articles altogether. Articles 43–54 are about how adults and governments should work together to make sure all children have their rights. Articles 1–42 are about how children should be treated. Here they are:

- ➔ **Article 1:** Everyone under 18 has these rights.
- ➔ **Article 2:** All children have the same rights, whether what their race or religion is.
- ➔ **Article 3:** Everyone who works with children should always do what is best for each child.
- ➔ **Article 4:** The government should make sure that all these rights are available to all children.
- ➔ **Article 5:** Children should help parents to help you to know about and use your rights as you grow up.
- ➔ **Article 6:** You have the right to life and to grow up to be healthy.
- ➔ **Article 7:** Your right to a name and nationality.
- ➔ **Article 8:** The government should respect your right to a name, not look at and keep it.



- ➔ **Article 9:** Your right to be with your parents if this isn't best for you.
- ➔ **Article 10:** Your right to see your family if they live in another country.
- ➔ **Article 11:** Your right not to be taken out of the country lightly.
- ➔ **Article 13:** Your right to say what you think about things and be listened to.



- ➔ **Article 15:** Your right to have your own beliefs.
- ➔ **Article 16:** Your right to follow your own religion.
- ➔ **Article 17:** Your right to meet with friends and join groups and clubs.

- ➔ **Article 18:** Your right to have privacy.
- ➔ **Article 17:** Your right to know information from newspapers and internet that you can understand.


- ➔ **Article 19:** Both parents have responsibility for looking after their children, and they should always think about what is best for each child.

- ➔ **Article 20:** You should not be forced and should be looked after and kept safe.
- ➔ **Article 21:** You should be looked after properly if you can't live with your own family.

- ➔ **Article 23:** Your rights to have the best place for you if you can't live with your parents.
- ➔ **Article 24:** Perhaps a child can have the same rights as children born in Wales.

- ➔ **Article 25:** Your right to special care and support if you are disabled so that your childhood is full and independent life.
- ➔ **Article 26:** Your right to good food and water and to see a doctor if you are ill.

- ➔ **Article 27:** Children who are working with their hands should be checked on regularly to make sure they are safe.
- ➔ **Article 28:** The right to extra money if your family hasn't got enough to live on.



- ➔ **Article 27:** Your right to a good standard of living.
- ➔ **Article 28:** Your right to learn and go to school.
- ➔ **Article 29:** Your right to become the best that you can be.
- ➔ **Article 30:** Your right to use your own language and celebrate your culture.
- ➔ **Article 31:** Your right to relax and play.

- ➔ **Article 32:** You should be protected from work that is dangerous.
- ➔ **Article 33:** You should be protected from dangerous drugs.

- ➔ **Article 34:** The government should protect children from sexual abuse.
- ➔ **Article 35:** You have a right not to be sold.
- ➔ **Article 36:** You should be protected from doing things that could harm you.

- ➔ **Article 37:** Your right to be treated fairly if you break the law.
- ➔ **Article 38:** Children should be protected from doing things that are illegal in the army if they are under 15.

- ➔ **Article 39:** Children should get special help if they have been abused.
- ➔ **Article 40:** Your right to legal help if you have been accused of breaking the law.

- ➔ **Article 41:** If the laws in your country protect you better than the rights in Wales, those laws should apply.
- ➔ **Article 42:** The government must let children and families know about children's rights.
