

Games glossary



This text explains some key words to do with ball games like rounders, tennis and basketball. Some of the words may be new to you, so read carefully.

backboard board which holds the shooting ring for basketball

backhand stroke tennis shot played with the back of the racket

backstop fielder who stands behind the batter in rounders

bat hitting the ball in rounders

bounce pass pass where the ball hits the ground first

bowl throwing the ball to the batter

chest pass throwing the ball from chest high in a game of basketball

cool-down exercises to relax your body after a game

dribble/dribbling bouncing the ball and running in basketball

field catching and throwing the ball in rounders

forehand stroke tennis shot played with the front of the racket

hamstring large group of muscles at top, back, of your legs

hitting T stand for the ball to sit on in rounders

joints parts of your body where two bones join together, like your shoulders, elbows and knees

muscles parts of your body which help you to bend and stretch

overarm pass throwing the ball with your arm up high

ring circle which the ball must go through to score in basketball

rounder making a score in rounders. At the end of a game, the team with the most rounders wins.

serve way of starting a game of short tennis

shooting trying to throw the ball at the backboard so it drops through the ring in basketball

stretching moving your joints and muscles as much as you can

underarm throw throwing a ball up with your arm starting down low

volley hitting a ball before it hits the ground

warm-up way of moving to get your body ready for exercise
