Message from Mrs Clarke

Dear Parents and Carers,

I hope you are all enjoying the beautiful blue skies and warmer weather. It certainly is uplifting!

As you are aware, the Government have announced earlier this week that all children will be returning to school on 8th March. We are very much looking forward to welcoming all the children back into school. At the moment, we are awaiting an update from the Local Authority and will then revise and update our risk assessment accordingly. We will share this with you next week, along with information about the return to school. The arrangements will be very similar to the arrangements in place before Christmas, as we had already put in many changes to reduce the risk of transmission. However, we will continue to follow the guidance from the DfE and the Local Authority and make all the changes that are required.

We are excited about seeing all the children back in school. We have been carefully planning how we will welcome all the children back into school and our whole school aims will be to:

- Treat each child as an **individual**, promptly responding to their needs
- Rebuild relationships with adults and friendships with peers
- Give children time and space to talk and express themselves through meaningful learning
- Provide structure and routines to rebuild positive learning behaviours and stamina
- Provide opportunities to develop or regain **fitness** levels
- Reestablish a whole-school **community** and celebrate each other's successes
- Whole-heartedly believe that **all things are possible** despite the difficulties and barriers presented by this pandemic and lockdown

For the first three weeks, we will be focusing on a whole school learning topic called 'From a tiny seed... what things are possible?'. This will allow our community to come together to build relationships, in a shared project across school which all children will contribute towards with our school vision at the heart. We are looking forward to seeing where this project takes us.

To help prepare your children for their return, Miss Firago has shared some helpful information for you to use with your children at home. Please spend time talking to your child about their return to school and address any concerns they have.



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YEAR LEARNING PICTURES

Year 5 have been busy working on their topic of Crime & Punishment. Much of their English work has been around the story of 'Holes' by Louis Sachar and the poem 'The Highwayman' by Alfred Noyes. They have written nonchronological reports about the deadly creature in Holes; the yellow spotted lizard. They have learned about the life cycles of different creatures in science and have produced art based on the creatures in Holes too. There has been plenty of well-being work along the way and even some hard labour too!

















Let's learn about yellow spotted lizards!

INTRODUCTION

Yellow spotted night lizards are reptiles. They are very shy, reclusive and can become angry when they are handled. These lizards are similar to the yellow spotted lizards in the book Holes by Louis Sachar.

WHAT THEY ARE

The yellow spotted night lizard is nocturnal. This means they come out at night

because it is hot during the day but it would get colder in the night. There Uncase is in the dual in the day but it would get colder in the hight. There is less chance they would be seen by predators and be eaten. They do not chase their pray down, they would lay and wait quietly. Anything that can fit in its mouth, it will eat! Most of this Lizards diet is made up from ants, centipedes, flies, scorpions and spiders. They are easier to catch in the night.

WHAT THEY LOOK LIKE

The yellow spotted night lizard grows up to 5 inches long so it is a small

lizard. The lizard has a brown and black scaly body with eleven yellow spots on their sides. Their heads are flat and long and you would recognise them by the swirly pattern on their tail. It would hurt if they bit you as they have very sharp

teeth.

HABITAT

Yellow Spotted Night Lizards live in tropical places like a rain forest or Central America. You would find them using logs or rocks for shelter and

cover from predators. This would be a damp and wet area called a micro habitat where they try and stay in the same area for the rest of their lives but they would only come out at night.


