

WHO'S TALKING?

Notes:

This activity will help develop thinking and questioning skills. Being able to question who you are talking to online and if you can trust them or not is an important online safety skill.

Activities:

1. With your child, read the quotes from the characters. Discuss if what they say seems trustworthy or not and why.

2. Ask your child to draw two trees, one labelled 'Trust' and the other labelled 'Don't trust'. They can then colour in their trees.

3. Cut out the characters on this worksheet for your child to colour in.

4. Ask your child which tree they think the characters belong with and stick on the chosen tree.

Remind your child that they can always talk with you, or another trusted adult, if they have any concerns online.

Further challenge:

Make/paint/draw your own 'Trust tree' models at home.

Note: These could be clay models, 3D collages made of recycled items or big pictures.

Encourage your child to tell you or another trusted adult when they see or hear something they trust or don't trust when they are online. You can then help them to write or stick it on their trees.

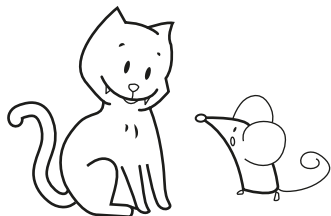
