

WHERE TO TURN?



Notes:

An important online safety skill for children and young people is knowing where or how to report problems that they or their friends may experience online. This game is intended to test their knowledge.

Activities:

1. Cut up the statement cards below.
2. Turn the cards face down on the floor or on a table.

3. Set a 30 second timer.

4. Turn over a card, read it aloud and decide if the statement is true or false.

5. Repeat this until all the cards have been turned over.

You can compete against your friends and family to see who completes the game in the quickest time with the most correct answers. The answers are at the bottom of the page, but don't peek until you've finished!

1. You are allowed to create a Facebook account at the age of 10

2. You can report inappropriate content on TIKTOK by clicking settings/report on the inappropriate profile

3. If you need help with an online problem it's best to keep it to yourself and not tell anyone

4. If your friends have a Snapchat account then it's totally safe for you to have one too

5. There are loads of cool games, quizzes and activities online at saferinternet.org.uk

6. You can check if facts you read in online stories are true by visiting Full Fact.org or Snopes.com

7. If you report harmful content at reportharmfulcontent.com then you have to give your real name

8. Childline.org.uk and Thinkyouknow.co.uk are great sites to go for help if you're worried

9. Talking to a trusted adult is a great idea if you're worried about any online issues

10. You are allowed to play PEGI 16 games if you are younger so long as you close your eyes in the nasty bits?
